Program Details:

This course is an innovative, online study abroad option for students that offers the opportunity to authentically explore and learn about another culture while earning university credits from the prestigious Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú (PUCP) located in Lima, Peru.

This course provides a basic understanding of Public Health and the most important indicators to track health at the population level. It uses global, regional and local (Peruvian) examples to present, understand and analyze a variety of health indicators. It will also prompt discussion and exchange to comprehend the complex networks that form the basis of well-being and disease.

The course will advance cross-cultural comparisons regarding the study of social values involved in health, the cultural nature of notions of health and disease, the coexistence of Western and non-Western systems and practices in the region. In addition, a series of practical cases on health dynamics in indigenous or native territory will be seen.



Instruction Delivery:

This course centers around two equally important aspects: academic coursework with Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú (PUCP) and cultural & discussion module that EdOdyssey will lead.

Classes with PUCP involve the presentation of problems and reflection led by the teacher as a facilitator of learning. This is complemented with some introductory readings on the topics and with a small group of guests to see specific cases of developments in health experiences.

EdOdyssey-led cultural & discussion weekly sessions will focus on participants' learning process about specific important topics that will allow them to connect themselves with Peruvian culture. Students will receive authentic support resources to engage them to make the course content fun, interesting and active in order to create a meaningful discussion at the end of every session.

Credits/Certificate Details:

Two (2) Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú academic credits.

Facilitators:

The Academic Module of the course will be taught by Gabriela Salmon, researcher in Public Health. Bachelor of Science, Biology with a minor in Biotechnology at the Universidad Nacional Agraria - La Molina, Peru. Gabriela completed epidemiology studies at the master's level at the Universidad Peruana Cayetano Heredia.



She obtained her Ph.D. from the Department of International Health, Epidemiology and Global Disease Control, Johns Hopkins University Bloomberg School of Public Health.

The Cultural & Discussion Module of the course will be taught by EdOdyssey's Program Coordinator Patricia Valencia, who has organized and led immersion, educational & cultural programs across various regions of Peru with dozens of American students from middle school, high school and institutions of higher education for the last three years and counting.



Requirements:

For this course, we encourage you to meet the following requirements:

- A webcam and a microphone for class activities
- Virtual attendance is mandatory for at least 70% of each course's activities. Unjustified absences to more than 30% of the activities will result in not being awarded the course's credits and not receiving an official transcript.

Resources/Materials:

Cultural Modules will include EdOdyssey-led sessions involving movies, documentaries, short videos and presentations. All program-related content will involve visuals for students to engage and participate in discussions.
